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# Having a barium small bowel meal

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Your doctor has advised that you have a barium small bowel meal. This leaflet aims to explain what will happen and answer frequently asked questions.

We will ask you to drink a white chalky fluid containing barium, which passes gradually through the small bowel and allows us to see it using x-rays.

We obtain images of your small bowel at intervals while the barium is passing through.

The speed at which the barium passes through the bowel varies from person to person. We usually need to wait for the barium to make its way along the whole length of your small bowel. We can sometimes complete the examination within one hour or it could take as long as three to four hours.

You will not be able to leave the department during this time but you will be free to move around. You may like to bring a book or a magazine with you.

### Before the examination

It is important that the stomach is completely empty. Please do not eat or drink for at least **six hours** before your appointment time.

Please leave any valuables at home. You are responsible for all personal items you bring into the hospital and the Trust cannot accept responsibility for their loss or damage.

### After the examination

You may eat and drink normally. The barium is not absorbed by the body and makes its way out through the bowel over the next few days, so you might notice a whiter stool than normal.

### If you have diabetes

Usual advice is **not** to take your usual morning insulin or diabetic tablets (such as metformin) but to bring them with you to take after the examination. Please bring something to eat if you need it. You may also wish to seek advice from the person who usually looks after your diabetes.

### Ionising radiation

This examination involves x-rays. We minimise your dose of x-rays so that the benefits of the examination outweigh the risks.

### Results

The radiologist will study the images and will send a report to the hospital team that requested the examination.
